Meeting Topic:

E-learning Overview and Updates

This meeting's main topic was presented by Dr. Baughman and Kimber Larson:

- Most recent percentage of student body e-learning full-time: 26% K-3, 33% 4-6, 28.2% 7-12
- Across the board, e-learners are falling behind in-person and hybrid students. This data looks at data across each grade level, demographic, etc.
- There are a number of successes and struggles that the teaching body
 has identified for this year, including: flexibility, adaptability, collaboration,
 engagement, planning & prep

Regarding K-6:

- 1. Instruction is a mixture of synchronous, asynchronous, and SEL connect instruction time
- 2. 5 instructional hours per day are provided
- 3. All student services remain, including IEPs, 504s and Intervention Engagement
- 4. The same district assessments and benchmark assessments are being used this year as in previous years.

Regarding 7-12:

5. Similar points to K-6 students mentioned above except that e-learners Zoom into classrooms where live instruction is taking place.
